Sub-recipients, Partner Agencies and Recipient

Washtenaw Intermediate School District's Early Childhood Department supports four center-based sub-recipients/partner agencies and one home-based site throughout Washtenaw County. The center-based agencies provide classes Monday-Thursday offering full programs for 427, 3 and 4-year-old children who lack access to quality resources within Washtenaw



County. By blending 170 Head Start slots with State funded Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) slots, agencies were able to make school-day programs available to 427 Head Start students. WISD's Head Start program also has prenatal mothers, infants and toddlers using a home-based Early Head Start model. Using this model, women, infants, and toddlers receive home visits using the parent education curriculum Parents as Teachers (PAT). Home visits are provided weekly for a minimum of 90 minutes where developmental parenting is supported using a coaching approach to parent



education. While allocation from Head Start allows WISD to serve 56 participants, through blending of state funding sources, Section 32p (4) Home Visiting adds an additional 9 eligible participants that can receive programming allowing WISD to serve 65 participants.

Grantee Budget

Early Childhood 2023-2024 Funding

Washtenaw ISD-supported early childhood programming exists within the nine cities of Washtenaw County. Four of the nine distinct districts currently offer center-based Head Start. Early Head Start services are provided in a home-based format and include socialization activities. As a result of the collaborative community partners and multiple funding streams, school districts and community-based organizations offer equitable services to over 2,000 children and families with the support of Washtenaw ISD.

*The original budget is \$5,555,495.00. The budget amendment identified in this chart increased the contractual line item, as a result of a successful application submitted for the use of unobligated funds from FY21. The funds requested and awarded were \$205,119.00. The funds were used to upgrade two play spaces, one at Ford Early Learning Center and the other at Perry Preschool. Both locations are operated by Ypsilanti Community Schools, Ypsilanti, MI and are two of three federally funded programs within the Ypsilanti school district.

Recruitment

The purpose of recruitment is to increase the community's awareness of WISD Childhood Programs to maximize the enrollment of children. The Head Start Program Performance Standards require specific efforts to actively locate and recruit children with disabilities and other vulnerable children, including homeless children and children in foster care. The goal of any recruitment process is to ensure full enrollment within our Head Start and Early Head Start programs. Recruitment is a year-round activity and does not stop when we hit full enrollment! We continue to recruit for the waitlist and for when children age out. Across our programs we have joined in more than 80+ events across Washtenaw County.

We are in partnership with the farmer's markets in Ann Arbor, Whitmore Lake, Manchester, Saline, Chelsea and Ypsilanti. Other events include Juneteenth events, back to school bashes, Jazz Fest, Touch-a-Truck, block parties, Trunk or treats/ Holiday events and library events. Other recruitment includes bus advertisements on the outside and inside of the bus, and weekly social media ads. Other efforts include flyers going out on pizza boxes, countless restaurants and businesses, book bundles to medical offices, local carnivals, and local parades.

Attendance

For the 2023-2024 program year, the WISD Head Start Grantee's Average Daily Attendance was at 83.69%.

Nutrition

The WISD Head Start programs provide children with nutritious meals in an environment where children and program staff eat family-style, which promotes children to practice social and developmental skills while staff serve as positive role models. Classroom meals are funded by CACFP and cover 47,811 breakfasts; 47,857 lunches; and 47,811 snacks.

Health

Head Start and Early Head Start staff were persistent in working with families to increase the percentage of children with medical homes, health insurance, and up to date immunizations. These numbers were exemplary with percentages over 89%. The percentage of children with dental homes has significantly improved this program year with percentages reaching 87%. We strive to ensure all children have access to appropriate medical and dental care with the goal of having healthy children ready for school and ready to learn.

Parent Involvement & Family Engagement

Washtenaw ISD Head Start Home-Based and Center Based Programs

Parents are invited to serve on the Policy Council and Parent Committees. These parents or family members serve as advocates for children and as ambassadors for the Head Start program.

This year our programs started off with a terrific opportunity for involvement we offered Dads & Donuts, Moms and Muffins the turnout was excellent we wanted to find a way to incorporate both parents in the program and to allow guardians and caregivers to participate as well. Both Early Head Start and Head Start offer families many opportunities to be involved in their child's learning to increase their knowledge of child development and to support their role as their child's first and best teacher.

Our parents and staff had the opportunity to attend the National Head Start Parent and Family Engagement Conference held in San Diego, California December 16-19, 2023. The Conference focused on how Head Start parents, families, and staff can best partner to promote both family engagement and children's development. The conference also explored a wide range of new resources and thinking on the forefront topics of early childhood development and how Head Start programs can address the needs of children, families, and staff.

Community Engagement

Our programs work to partner with community agencies and support families to connect with these partners, as needed. Likewise, Washtenaw ISD works to maintain connections to community. agencies to benefit our children and families.

During the 2023-2024 school year, our community partners provided a variety of services to children and families including:

Toys for Tots- Provided all our families with toys for the Christmas Holiday, the intent was that none of our preschool go without something for Christmas. This partnership continues to be valuable to EHS/HS to ensure all our children receive something during the holiday season.





Food Gathers - Our partnership with food gatherers was a huge help to our families, supplemental food was given out for families who were experiencing food insecurities. They also provided household items, personal care items, and cleaning supplies.

PBS Kids- Early Childhood Team Offered Virtual Parent Meet Ups, for Parents and Guardians via Zoom these meetings occurred the 2nd Thursday of each month for children 0-8 years old. The focus of the workshops was for parents to learn how to start early, making learning fun and exciting for your child.





Washtenaw County Department of Health and Human Services- provided help to families with children, for food and toy distribution during the holiday assistance for families in need.

Family Engagement

Book and Ballets

We are excited to share with you information about the Books and Ballet Program held at the Ypsilanti Community Schools Beatty Site! This is a national non-profit organization that is offering a literacy and dance mentoring program for children ages 3-5 years old. The program began on October 6th,2023 We had 20 children to participate in the program wide. Ten dance students from the University of Michigan were facilitators for the children. The classes lasted 8 weeks and ended with a Nutcracker performance at the University of Michigan in December. Books and Ballet was very successful

BlockFest

BLOCK Fest was developed to provide an interactive block building experience for young children ages 8 months to 8 years and their parents. BLOCK Fest helps parents and children to form an emotional bond during the learning experience. The exhibit has been shown to increase parent knowledge of early development in the areas of math and science education while providing opportunities to increase social skills and literacy opportunities for young children. BLOCK Fest is a family interactive event that uses five-block play stations to introduce children and their parents to the educational value of blocks. We are the first agency in Michigan to have this program available to our families.



Home Base- Early Head Start

Fitness- Our family fitness fun event was a blast! We had an energetic Zumba session that got everyone moving, along with fantastic giveaways including YMCA swag and memberships along with Planet Fitness swag and day passes. Attendees also enjoyed a delicious baked potato bar. It was a great day of fitness, fun, and community!









Wiard's Orchard - October 2023

In October 2023, Early Head Start families enjoyed a delightful field trip to Wiard's Orchard. The outing provided a wonderful opportunity for children and parents to engage in fun activities amidst the beautiful autumn scenery. 


Donuts with Dads- February 2024

Pop-up safety towns are free family events that feature different stations attendees can visit that provide injury prevention education and methods on bike helmets, car seats, dog bite prevention, medication safety and pedestrian safety. The stations are created to look like different buildings one would find in a town. Children who attend the events leave with adjustable bike helmets and a free book.







Playground Dedication at YCS Ford and Perry

Washtenaw Intermediate School District worked collaboratively with Ypsilanti Community Schools to design, select and install the new playgrounds. We were very fortunate to work closely with the Region V leadership to secure the additional funding necessary to successfully install these playgrounds. On February 12th, YCS Ford and Perry each had dedication ceremonies for their new playgrounds. Families and staff alike were in attendance to celebrate the new equipment, and members of the media were on hand as well to document the event.







Disability and Mental Health Services

Sub-recipient agencies support the inclusion of children with disabilities in everyday programming. This inclusive experience is beneficial for all children and fosters confidence and positive self-esteem. Mental Health services are provided in collaboration with the Grantee Behavioral Health Specialist and staff at the sub-recipient sites. The recipient uses a tiered conceptual framework of evidence-based practices for promoting healthy social and emotional development and to increase mental health awareness, promotion, and prevention.

National Head Start Awareness

In honor of October being National Head Start Awareness month the WISD created the Head Start Awareness Award. Head Start staff took nominations from program staff to recognize staff members, parents and community members that through their association with a Head Start program exhibited the benefits of Head Start.

Sue Wanamaker, a Head Start parent, who with the assistance of Head Start staff, obtained her college degrees, employment with Head Start and now is the Early Childhood Director for Whitmore Lake Public Schools. She has served Head Start children and families for over 30 years.

Chris Sturdivant, a Ypsilanti Community Schools bus driver, received the award because in his work as a bus driver he illustrates the importance of connecting with children at all levels of the program and how essential each role is to their growth and development. In his four years of working as a preschool bus driver, Chris has brought smiles to many Head Start children, listened to their stories and praised their accomplishments.

Margaret Lewis, an Early Head Start Home Visitor, and former classroom assistant teacher received the award because of all the above and beyond work she has done wth families. From teaching parents about child development to connecting them to much need resources, to assisting them in registering for English Learning classes, Margaret has diligently worked to remove barriers for Head Start children and families.







Education – Supporting High Quality Preschool Classrooms

Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS)

High quality adult child interactions are at the heart of the work that we do in preschool classrooms as they build the foundation for learning, both during the preschool years and in a child's later education. The CLASS® tool is utilized in all our classrooms to look deeply at these interactions. The tool has 10 dimensions of teacher-child interactions rated on a 7-point scale. (Note: The Negative Climate dimension is reverse scored) The 10 CLASS® dimensions are organized into three domains: Emotional Support, Classroom Organization, and Instructional Support.

All classrooms have CLASS observations conducted at least once a year. Data from these observations is used to support individual teaching teams, focusing on their many strengths, and building goals around areas that need improvement. Site and county-wide data is used to plan professional development in the coming year, including our yearly conference for teachers and other program staff.



Celebrating our Successes and Moving Forward Together

The WISD Early Childhood Education team provided **professional development** throughout the 2023-2024 school year, including the county-wide annual conference and quarterly trainings. Featuring content that ranged from curriculum to health to connecting with families, the annual conference was attended by teachers, directors, family support and other staff from across the county. In addition to these county-wide opportunities, WISD Early Childhood Staff provide individualized support and training throughout the year to classrooms, sites and programs.

To support programs in maintaining quality learning environments for children, WISD Early Childhood Education Team members continued the use of the Practice Based Coaching model. We also used the CLASS tool, described above, to look at the quality of teacher-child interactions in the classrooms and support teachers in making meaningful changes to enhance the learning and development of preschool children. Average CLASS scores for the preschool classrooms observed throughout Washtenaw County in 2023-2024 exceeded the Head Start National Averages from 2020 in all three major areas or domains- Emotional Support, Classroom Organization, and Instructional Support. WISD Education staff continued to use the CLASS framework in our support and coaching of teachers as well as in professional development provided to education staff.

All classrooms supported by Washtenaw ISD Head Start funding, utilizing the High Scope curriculum and the associated child assessment tool, COR-A. Teachers observe children, enter anecdotes, and plan for individualized activities and instruction based on that information. The High Scope curriculum is play-based and has a solid research base. Our teachers are supported in the use of the Plan-Do-Review sequence and the incorporation of the 5 Ingredients of Active Learning (materials, manipulation, choice, child thought & language, and adult scaffolding) into their daily routine.

The Pajama Program



During the 2023-2024 school year, 7 centers serving Head Start and the state funded Readiness Program provided the Pajama Program to over 1,100 children. program with the Pajama Program. The Pajama Program provides programming to include sleep health education for children, parents, caregivers, and educators in efforts to ensure that children are fully supported at bedtime. The National Pediatric Association recognizes sleep as a critical factor in the overall health of children.

A Parent Follow Up survey was conducted in May 2023.

- 14% of parents/caregivers completed the survey about six weeks after program delivery.
- Parents/caregivers had received training from Head Start staff (82%) and/or their child had. received the classroom curriculum (88%).
- 33% of parents report that they are now following a bedtime routine.
- 51% reported that they are now doing calming activities like reading or drawing before bedtime.
- 73% of reporting parents say they are now providing healthy snacks before bed.
- 25% of parents reported that they are using the materials they received from the program.
- 93% of parents reported that they are turning off TV and other screens before bedtime.
- 60% report that they are getting their children to bed closer to 8:00 pm.
- 80% of parents report that they are doing what they can to keep their child's sleep space quiet, cool, and dark.



- 33% report that their children are getting more and/or better sleep.
- Mostparents (90%) said that what they and/or their childlearned had been helpful to their family.
- 57% of teachers reported that they look for to doing the program again next year.
- 88% of teachers reported that nap time was easier, and children were engaged.
- 100% of Family Support Staff reported that the program information was helpful to parents.
